3. Annual Report from The Chairman

The Chair gave the following report for the past year

- We have purchased and installed new swings and fencing for the Play Area.
- The Speed limit has been updated through the village.
- Planted cherry trees by the Village Hall drive.
- Litter pick has been carried out 24 bags of rubbish has been collected.
- The graffiti around the village will be cleaned up.
- The waste collections are going very well with Breckland.

The Chair went on to thank the whole of the Parish Council for their support given to him during his ill health during the past year, it was very much appreciated.

4. Annual Report from Weeting CE School

The Head Teacher was unable to attend the meeting, so the following report was read out by Cllr S. Nairn on her behalf: -

Staffing and Classes

We have 5 classes open – nursery, reception, Y1/2, Y3/4 and Y5/6. In September 2025 Little Saints Preschool and the staff team became part of the school, renamed as Acorn Class. We are now able to provide education for children aged 2-11 years old. This development provides further stability and future proofing of a school in the village. Numbers remain constant and the 3-year forecast for the school shows that these are likely to remain stable, with a slight increase showing during this

Held on Thursday 15th May 2025 at 7.00pm in Weeting Village Hall time. Our positive Ofsted inspection in July 2024 continues to have a huge positive impact on our reputation. For 2025/26 4 out of 5 classes are full and we have a waiting list for both nursery and reception places.

Our Breakfast Club and After School Club, which opened in September 2023, has provided working parents with access to extended school provision. We are pleased to announce that as part of a Norfolk County Council wraparound provision we have extended our opening time to 6pm and have employed an additional member of staff to support numbers.

Church and Community Involvement

We have continued to be regular users of St Mary's, with the whole school and their families attending Christingle, Remembrance Day and Easter services. We are continuing to work with Rev Juanita as she steps into her new role. As part of the Diocese of Ely's Lent Challenge the children participated in a 40-day physical activity challenge. Each day the children participated in either a dance session or daily mile run. As a school we raised £409 for Young Minds, a national children's mental health charity. We commemorated VE Day by holding a street party on the playground with home-made bunting and an ocean of red, white and blue outfits.

We have participated in the Tesco Stronger Together blue token scheme, receiving £1500 which was used to purchase gardening equipment, planters and storage which are in weekly use by our lunch time club. The children are currently planting up around school and will move out on to Parrott's Piece next term.

We have participated in DEMAT Together projects, joining with Year 6 classes from all 39 schools in the DEMAT Carol Service at Ely Cathedral and have had 35 pieces of Artwork selected for this year's DEMAT art exhibition to be held in Ely in June 2025. I shared our approach to the teaching of art to headteachers at a DEMAT conference. As part of our enrichment priorities we have provided the children with visits and visitors including a whole school trip to the pantomime in King's Lynn, new born lambs from a farming parent, a drama workshop for World Book Day and class trips including visits to Science Lab in Norwich, Gressenhall Museum, Roar Dinosaur Park and a watercolour painting session on the lawn at Sandringham House!

Held on Thursday 15th May 2025 at 7.00pm in Weeting Village Hall Our wider community involvement has included providing placements for 2 PGCE students from UEA, Norwich. We have hosted sports holiday clubs for children in the Easter and Summer holidays.

Our Friends of Weeting work tremendously hard to provide our children with additional resources. This year they are fundraising towards a collection of everyday games that families can borrow to support maths understanding.

2024-25 School Priorities

This year the school has 5 key educational priorities:

- 1 Improve outcomes for Maths across the school.
- 2 Improve staff confidence and quality of teaching in English, Computing and Design Technology.
- 3 Update the EYFS curriculum to incorporate teaching and learning expectations for 2,3- and 4-year-olds.
- 4 Embed the role of the subject leader and establish a consistent monitoring and improvement cycle across all subjects.
- 5 Improve use of individual and group data to inform teaching and learning and intervention needs.

5. Annual Report from St Mary's Church

Reverend Juneta gave the following report: -

Services

- My title is Associate Priest, that is, a fully ordained priest who assists the Rector in the running of the 4 parishes of the Grimshoe Benefice (Weeting, Hockwold, Northwold, Feltwell)
- Mother Joan retired at Easter, and we are still waiting for a new Rector to be appointed I am not the new Rector.
- In this time of waiting, we will ensure that services still go ahead at the usual times 1st and 3rd Sundays at 11.00am.
- The 1st Sunday will be Holy Communion with me leading, the 3rd Sunday will vary, with lead from a Priest or Lay Minister from nearby Wissey Valley group of parishes.

- We have had some very enjoyable contacts with the Primary School, including a wonderful Easter service in church the space was able to be used well to accommodate both parents and children.
- I have met with Dr Hardie to ensure the close links between church and school continue.

Building

- A big thank you to everyone who has helped us bring the church building back from the brink of dereliction; especially to the PCC for all their hard work in fundraising, shifting furniture, cleaning, etc, and keeping the services going; to the Childerhouses for looking after the pews; to all who have generously supported our fundraising efforts especially the haircut and pancake party; to those who attended the recent public meeting with representatives from the Diocese, and showed their interest in helping; and to anyone I've missed out!
- Our vision/plans for the church involve sorting out the drainage; repairing and refurbishing the roof inside; a new floor to replace the temporary one; improving the heating, lighting, and sound system; improving accessibility, including the installation of a toilet, and a kitchen/servery.
- A project group is to be formed from both the church community and, crucially, the wider community of the village. You don't need to be a churchgoer to be a part of this group.
- There will be a public meeting on July 25th at 7pm, during which we'll present our future plans everyone welcome.

6. Annual Report from the Village Hall Committee

The Village Hall has done quite well over the last 12 months, it all started with some little people throwing stones etc through the window on the field side, all the safety glass fell out onto the concrete step, so as I was cleaning it up, a mother came past with two little children and one of them started to pick the glass pieces up, I did suggest that mummy take her children away, that window was replaced at a cost of f250.

We then had Mr Tim Murfitt put ramps outside the French windows onto the playing field, a very good job and is much appreciated as now so much easier for any wheelchair users to get in and out.

Not long after that, the insurance company said that they wanted fire alarms throughout the building, Karen, our head treasurer tired to get a grant for this but a no-go so we paid out the have the whole system installed and that was another f,4,000.

Then we got another window broken again, on field side at the other end, someone suggested dummy cameras which we did indeed put up, thanks to Cllr Peter Nordan.

At the next Parish Council meeting, the cameras were discussed and by the very generous donation from the Parish Council, we had real cameras installed, as you can imagine, this made another hole in our finances.

The usual group put on a quiz in October and a craft show in November, and a pantomime in December to help with the funds, but we still needed more, so after another quiz in February, a group of ladies got together with some more ladies having had their arms twisted to join in to help run a venture (only kidding) and the first Lunch Club was held on the last Tuesday in January. It has gone from strength to strength and only this week a new dishwasher was installed in the kitchen and at last count our lunch club has put over £1000 into the halls deposit account.

The hall committee ran its Annual Meeting last Monday and all the officers were voted back in for another year.

All the clubs that use the hall on a regular basis are still with us, but we do know that a few are struggling with the extra payment of £2.00 per hour, so our vice chair Sue Jones is going to have a meeting with them to see if we can help them, as we all know things change from one week to the next, and we would rather help them than lose them.

- I am Jo Nordan, Captain of Weeting Bowls Club and I am here to speak on their behalf.
- The last 12 months, subsequent to our golden anniversary year, has been very busy with ongoing maintenance and improvements.
- The mild winter and spring provided excellent conditions for the restoration work on the green to continue, a new mower has been purchased, and our two volunteer green keepers have worked tirelessly, mowing, seeding, weeding, feeding and rolling the grass, the green is now greatly improved, much to the delight of the bowlers.
- Padlocked gates have been made to measure and fitted at both entrances to the bowls club to prevent people using the club path as a short cut from The Row to the village centre and playing fields.
- Also, to protect the green from unwelcome footfall members, a new fence has been erected along the edge of the green, and access is restricted to people who are wearing the required footwear.
