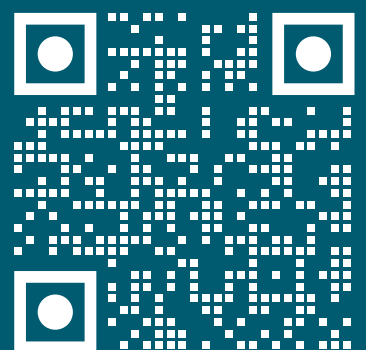
The Government has launched a public consultation on its plans to restructure Local Government in Norfolk, replacing the county council, Breckland Council, and the county's other district councils.

What is being proposed?

The Government is planning to abolish the county council and all existing borough, city, and district councils in Norfolk. It will replace them with new 'unitaries authorities'

These would become responsible for the broad range of local services where you live.

People across Norfolk are being encouraged to tell the Government how many unitary authorities you think would be best for Norfolk's future and help shape the Government's thinking.

The strength of three

As part of the Future Norfolk partnership, Breckland Council's preferred model is for three unitary authorities for Norfolk:

- Three authorities of significant size and scale.
- Three authorities whose communities are different, with distinct needs best served by bespoke local public services.
- Three authorities which reflect the differences across our county - from city to coast to countryside.
- Three authorities which have economic opportunities which, alongside our partners, can unlock new homes, new skills and new jobs for local people.
- Three authorities which are financially sustainable, safe and legal, with real opportunities to drive efficiencies, savings and local benefit.
- Three local authorities which move into annual surplus from year 4, following some transition costs which initially outweigh savings.

What are the options?

The Government is consulting on three options:

Three councils: East Norfolk, West Norfolk and Greater Norwich, proposed jointly by the Future Norfolk partnership of Breckland District Council, Broadland District Council, Great Yarmouth Borough Council, Borough Council of King's Lynn and West Norfolk, North Norfolk District Council, and Norwich City Council.

Two councils: Two unitary authorities proposed by South Norfolk District Council.

One council: Whole of Norfolk proposed by Norfolk County Council.
