When our School Lollipop Patrol man, Mr Byrne, retired after many years of safely seeing local children and their families across the very busy road that divides Weeting, Norfolk County Council (NCC) decided not to replace him. Knowing the danger that this would create, the Parish Council (PC) and the school lobbied our County Councillor and NCC in an attempt to reverse the decision. However, we were told that we did not meet the County's criteria for a replacement as there were not enough children using the patrol. How or when they came to that conclusion is unknown.



Since then, the PC have tried to keep up the pressure and NCC have at last made a positive move by installing a flashing light system that should be activated electronically during the relevant times of the day when parents and children need to cross the road. However, it will only slow traffic down (we hope) as they approach the area of road near the school and will not stop vehicles, so extreme care must still be taken when wanting to cross over. Any children who walk to school by themselves need to be drilled to use the Green Cross Code in order to optimise their safety. Despite the speed limit changes put in place earlier this year, our speed recorder camera has still registered a significant number of motorists significantly exceeding the speed limit.

Nature Notes

Has anyone noticed the abundance of acorns this year?

This year is what is called a "mast year" for acorns when oak trees produce a significantly larger than usual crop. This typically occurs every few years and is thought to be a strategy by the trees to overwhelm acorn predators in order to



ensure that sufficient acorns survive to germinate.

not a random event, but a large seed production requires a lot of energy and very often the oak will produce fewer acorns in subsequent years as it recovers.

Let Me Introduce Myself

My name is Rev. Juanita Hawthorne, and I am the Associate Priest for the Grimshoe Benefice, which comprises St. Mary's, Feltwell; St. Andrew's, Northwold; St. James, Hockwold; and St. Mary's, Weeting. As a fully ordained priest (vicar), I assisted Mother Joan Horan when she was here.



Now that she has retired, I am in overall charge, assisted by ordained and lay ministers from our sister benefice in Wissey Valley, until a new Rector is appointed. My working days are Tuesday, Wednesday (afternoon), Friday, and Sunday, although this can be flexible in terms of weddings and funerals.

I would like to thank all those who have kindly supported us in fund raising events, such as the Book Sale, completed the survey about how the church is/should be used, and who have attended our recent meetings about the urgently needed building repairs. (With apologies for the poor sound quality, exacerbated by a microphone that wasn't working properly.)

At the meeting on July 25th, after the welcome and introductions, a brief history of St. Mary's was presented, concluding with the urgent repair work needed to the building (see Village Life edition 49, March 2025 for more details). This was followed by a talk about how the church is currently being used, and our vision for the future.

Samuel Pedlar and Holly Robinson, from Ely Diocese then spoke further, outlining the processes for getting grant funding, and how vital it is that people from all over the village help with the skills they have, and that you do not have to be a churchgoer to do so. More details of Samuel's talk can be found on page 11.

The meeting concluded with an open questions time which raised many interesting issues such as the possibility of links with the castle; whether we have water or are linked to mains sewerage drains; do we have Wi-Fi facilities; chancel repair liability; having concerts and events in church; having the church open more often; offers. of fundraising activities; and the problem of tackling apathy.

The next step is a meeting on September 17th at 7.00pm, at the church, during which we hope to form a Project Steering Group to put our plans into action, achieving our vision of a church which is the centre of village life, with improved heating, lighting and audio-visual resources; one which is accessible to all; one with an indoor toilet and This is a natural phenomenon and occurs in many tree species. It is a kitchen/servery; one with the majestic history of this ancient building highlighted; a place for our children to be baptised, our young people to marry, and our loved ones to be laid to rest; a place for the school and the community to use; and, of course, a place to be still and to encounter God.

The whole school was treated to an iRock Assembly where our budding musicians and singers demonstrated some very professional performances that they had been practising over the last few months.



Mrs Hoggins led an explosive science workshop, Miss Marshall led a puppet making session and Miss Woodison led a creative storytelling and clay


character making session.

BRECKLAND CATS PROTECTION

Cats need fresh, clean and cool drinking water to keep them hydrated and healthy. Water is necessary for good circulation, digestion and bowel movements. Although cats don't drink large amounts, hydration is vital for their survival. It's important to remember that milk, cream or any



other liquid is no substitute for water in a cat's diet. In fact, many cats are lactose intolerant, which means they have difficulty digesting dairy products. Drinking milk could make them unwell.

Cats drink water in a fascinating way. They extend the tip of their tongue to the water's surface, curling it backwards so only the top touches the liquid. Then, they retract their tongue at speeds of nearly 80cm per second, bringing water with it. The water molecules stick to the tongue and each other forming a column that reaches their mouth. Cats catch the top of this column without getting their chin wet. They can only lap up a small amount of water each time, but as they can lap at an impressive rate of four laps per second, it is an efficient and neat way to quench their thirst.


The amount of water cats need to drink varies depending on their age and weight. Kittens up to 3 months old (weighing 1.4kg), need 70ml a day. Six-month-old kittens (weighing 2.7kg) need 135ml a day. Medium cat weighing 4kg need 200ml a day and large cats weighing 6kg 300nl a day.

Signs of dehydration include – lethargy, panting, refusal to eat, sunken eyes and dry or sticky gums. Excessive drinking (also known as polydipsia) can indicate health problems like diabetes, kidney disease or hyperthyroidism, leading to increased peeing. If your cat drinks more than usual, consult your vet to rule out serious conditions.

Tips to encourage your cat to drink more are refilling their water bowl daily, place bowls throughout the house, try a different water bowl, try a water fountain, keep water and litter trays separate, separate the food bowl too. Switch to wet food and add some flavour such as tuna juice from tuna packed in water, (not oil), or add chicken broth which will make the water more enticing for your cat. Just make sure the flavouring doesn't include too much salt as this is unhealthy for your cat.

Weeting Parish Council Archives

August 1970 - November 1971

There is no doubt that Rosemarie's typed minutes are an improvement on the written ones in the past. We are now in August 1970 with the new Chair, Mr N Parrott. There was a bill of £1,195 from Moorfits for approval (that is £23,623 now) and an application approved to arrange a precept to cover the expense. There was a number of expenses that the Council agreed to postpone considering and they also felt it was unnecessary to join the Association of Parish Councils.

There was considerable discussion regarding the Playing Field with agreement that an application should be made for grant funding for the chain-link fence and clearance of the site. However, it would appear that Much of what had been discussed at the Parish Meeting was revisited in Morfitts when they levelled the stumps, had failed to do so in the entrance. Mr Parrott offered his tractor and trailer and this was hoped to be completed for £20. Under AOB the problem of litter was again brought up as was the continued repair and respraying of cars in the road at All the end of the financial year, dependent on the amount available. The Saints.

In November 1970, the meeting had six members of the Council attending clearance of the site was agreed. It was also confirmed that six cars had with one apology. At this meeting, the councillors agreed that they would join the Association of Parish Councils but at their own expense and not the public. Good News, it was reported that the matter of car repairs on the public highway had been dealt with. The imagination boggles: However, it was agreed that Mr Parrott would enquire whether advice from the Planning Authorities could be given for any future developments in the village. As a result of a letter from the Atmere Trust, it was agreed that Mr Parrott would represent the Parish Council at their meetings - (I believe Richard together with two other colleagues, is still involved with this Charity to this day - some 55 odd years later.) The Norfolk Education Committee offered £358.00 towards the cost of the playing fields.

Regarding the playing field, it was noted that not much progress had been made with the fencing but that the grass was growing a lot thicker and thought needed to be given to cutting the field next year. A proposal to explore the possibility of eight Alms Houses built in the village was adopted unanimously. There was still concern over the behaviour of some American residents, calling for another meeting with the Relations Officer at the base. Further concern was expressed over the danger of lorries on the bends in the village and it was agreed to take this to the County Council.

1971 and Mr Parrott reported on the Atmere Meeting that he said was held to discuss the sale of land owned by the Trust at Old Buckenham. Continuing on the question of Alms Houses, there was considerable The dumping of rubbish was again raised with the proposal that the discussion as it would appear that these would not be available and it was Police be involved and it was noted that the Butcher's Shop was up for decided to find out how many people would be prepared to move into them. It was reported that successful remedial action had been taken over the behaviour of the American residents. (the mind boggles). Road sweeping would be done in the village every two weeks (I wish) but there were problems with lorries negotiating the bends at Gays Corner (? Anyone know where this is). Fencing had now been erected on the north side of the playing field and sufficient birch trees had been donated to be planted close to the fencing. It was agreed to write a letter of thanks to the donor on behalf of the Parish Council and Norfolk County Council would week) and Mr I Grass, (what a very aptly named gentleman), be invited be cutting the grass.

Consternation was expressed regarding the butchers and Mr Parrott The final meeting of the year was held on the 1st November 1971 with agreed to try and sort the problem. It was anticipated that to meet expenditure a rate of 6d would be required for the next year. It was reported that rubbish was being tipped in the pit by Peppers Hill and that a letter be sent to the Forestry Commission requesting them to fill the pit in. (All meetings appear to open at 8.00 pm but there is no note to show how long they lasted, only that there was no other business and the meeting up, the offenders would be prosecuted. closed)

Come March 1971 the Annual Parish Meeting was well attended regarding the Butcher's shop, a petition from the village had been taken to the County Council - Mrs Drewry noted on behalf of the Parish Council, the building was a monstrosity and had been a concern of the Parish Council for a long time. However, the Parish Council options were limited and the whole matter was the result of bad planning decisions made by the authorities.

As a result of an enquiry as to whether there could be two Parish Meetings per year, it was decided to form a Rate Payers Association in the village to support the villagers and also contribute to the Parish Council as well. The eternal question of grass cutting was raised, it was confirmed that Swaffham RDC did this twice a year and it was suggested that the public could help to keep the village tidy. A complaint was also made about the condition of the South Park Wall and it was established this was the responsibility of the owners, Mr Childerhouse (there is no initial!) but the Parish Council would try and progress the situation.

There was considerable concern raised about dog fouling in the village, especially in the children's playground and the Parish Council agreed to remedy this. The Annual Meeting was then followed by the Parish Council Meeting with all councillors attending.

the Parish Council meeting but it was noted that the construction of the sewage plant had begun. The Church had requested financial help towards the upkeep of the churchyard and it was agreed to give £50 at official date for the opening of the Village Hall and work to complete the been removed from All Saints and the Police had been advised.

The 1971 Annual General meeting was held on the 1st June and there was unanimous approval of Mr N Parrott as Chairman, with Mr Holledge as Vice-Chair. It was reported that the Parochial CC had purchased a new grass cutter and again the question of the provision of Alms Houses was raised. Mr Burlingham raised the matter of the wall along South Park and the potential dangers of children going to school. It was agreed that the Chair would speak to Messrs Childerhouse after taking advice on the matter. Grant Aid of £122 had been received towards the cost of the fencing. Improvements to the street lighting was agreed including the light at the Pump House in Rectory Lane (?). An additional special meeting was held on the 22nd July to consider the request by the football club for a pitch on the playing field. It was unanimously agreed that the club be asked to accept the pitch as already marked out by the County Council, that £40 be offered for the goal posts and nylon nets be purchased with the possibility of grant aid being sought. Charges were agreed both for use of the field and also the changing room with the provision of a "roadworks" type toilet (a direct quote from the minutes)

Well into summer, the Parish CC met on the 2nd August where it was reported that there was little interest in the tenancy of potential Alms Christmas being a thing of the past, the Council next meets in February Houses in the village, but that Messrs Childerhouse had repaired their part of the wall along South Park and Swaffham RDC were taking measures to make the remaining part of the wall safe.

sale. There was also a note that councillors were proposing an annual precept of £1000 (£18060 now). Repairs to equipment in the playground was approved, alterations to lighting approved as was the installation of the light in Pilgrims Way.

It was noted that cars were driving across the playing field and it was agreed that posts should be put in place to prevent this happening. At this point it was unanimously agreed that a caretaken should be employed to look after the playing field at the (princely sum of £1 per to fill the post.

At a subsequent special meeting, Mr Holledge and Mr L Burlingham were appointed School Managers.

Extract from Samuel Pedlar's presentation on July 25th

My name is Samuel Pedlar, and I work with the Diocese of Ely Church Buildings Department. My role is to support churches as they care for their historic buildings and work with their communities.

St. Mary's has stood in Weeting for over 700 years. It's where we've come together for weddings, funerals, harvest festivals, carol services and quiet reflection. It is one of just 133 round tower churches in Norfolk, a rare architectural gem with medieval roots, later Victorian restorations and deep ties to the life of Weeting. But now the church needs your help if it is to continue serving the village for the next 700 years.

The Project Group

To achieve this vision, we're creating a Project Group - a team of local volunteers who will work alongside the PCC. (Parochial Church Council) You do not need to be a regular churchgoer. You just need to care about the future of this historic space.

Autumn Gardening



I'm writing this article in heat wave no4. This summer has really taken a toll on our gardens! Heatwaves used to be a rarity but temperatures over 30 degrees seem to be increasingly common. England just had its warmest June since records began in 1884, according to the Met Office. Extended periods of very hot dry weather pose two big problems for gardeners: the impact of heat on temperate plants and the lack of rain.

A lack of water can severely limit a plant's growth. But even after it starts to rain regularly again, plants can still suffer from problems related to prolonged drought. In general, if perennials manage to survive, they tend to fare better than woody plants. Short-term damage includes wilting, leaf scorch, and some defoliation. Long-term damage from drought includes stunted growth, branch die-back, and possible death of the plant.

One common long-term effect of drought is stem dieback, which is a result of the loss of fine feeder roots. As soils become dry the fine roots in the upper soil surface may be stimulated to increase in number to get what little water is available. However, if the soil remains dry they will begin to die, thus putting the root system out of balance with the amount of foliage. When rain does return, the plant may not be able to take full advantage of this much-needed water because of its reduced root mass. The result is a resizing of the canopy through branch die-back.

During a drought our lawns are never going to look at their best and will soon turn dormant and start to go brown. To determine if a lawn is dormant or dead, inspect it down at the soil level. Lawns that have gone dormant will have brown leaves, but the crown at the base of the leaves will still be green, and the roots will have a healthy off-white colour. If a lawn is completely dead, the entire plant—leaves, crowns, and roots—will be brown and brittle. If the lawn is in fact dead, your only options are to either reseed or lay turf. You can help your dormant lawn by implementing a recovery plan of scarifying, aeration and over-seeding. Early Autumn is a great time to get on with this even whilst it is dry because recovery will be rapid once rain arrives.

Mediterranean-style gardens are becoming more popular in the UK as many areas become more susceptible to drought. Planting with species that have naturally evolved to live in hot, dry conditions means your garden will be more resilient in dry periods and more sustainable in its use of water — an extremely precious resource during our increasingly hot summers. However, issues can arise in winter as the combination of prolonged wet and cold can kill them. Protecting their crowns from the worst of the winter wet really makes a difference. As can ensuring adequate drainage to pots, make sure you lift them off the ground. I don't feel that changing your garden to entirely mediterranean planting is currently the right answer, neither is sub-tropical gardens as these plants generally will not survive any cold weather.

Knowing your plants exact requirements and caring for them properly are the best ways to lessen a drought's long-term impact. Incorporating organic matter into your soil, weeding regularly, watering infrequently (a couple of times a week is ideal) but deeply with soaker hoses or drip irrigation, and applying mulch over the soil around your plants are the best ways to help them weather a drought. Trimming back shrubs, or overly lush perennials can also help, as mentioned previously regarding root systems. Strategic feeding and nutrient management is essential. A single application of balanced slow-release NPK feed in early summer supports flowering and fruiting through heatwaves without burning roots. Topped up with a fortnightly application of a liquid seaweed fertiliser that contains micronutrients and trace elements will help plants cope with stress. Avoid High Nitrogen Feeds: In extreme heat, nitrogen encourages soft, succulent growth that wilts easily.

Top tips for Autumn:

- Clip conifer hedges. If you leave this too late any new growth will be damaged by frost.
- Sow seeds of mizuna, mustard, rocket and winter hardy lettuce.
- Plant evergreen shrubs whilst the soil is still warm.
- Plant winter flowering pansies & violas in tubs & baskets.
- Plant spring flowering bulbs


Weeting Village Hall

THE HOOVER DAM

This is a follow up of our Grand Canyon trip. Whilst we were on holiday in the USA we visited the Hoover Dam. This is situated at the east end of Lake Mead; a huge stretch of water about 180 miles long by 10 miles wide and it supplies most of the water to Las Vegas as well as the surrounding areas. You can also



go on guided tours over, under, and inside it. That is where the fun starts...

You are required to wear high viz jackets and hard hats, although, can you believe that they couldn't find a hat made to fit my big head? They tried the largest one by modifying the straps, but to no avail. Their only course of action was to stick some tape over the hat and around my head! The guide fell about laughing whilst calling me "Big Head". Really? Me?

Our group was then invited to walk across the top of the dam, which we did. I could feel my heart beating as I looked over the edge, for it is 800ft from the surface to the water on the 'exit' or the 'low side'. Four huge outlet pipes shoot the exit water from the electric generator turbines across the Colorado River, making a loud roar whilst also causing a great cloud of water vapours.

We were then taken down to one of the overflow pipes. As we walked along, I observed that it was 6ft deep and lit by lamps all the way to the outlet that overlooks the exit side. I placed my hand on the edge of the pipe and was very surprised to feel it was moving. I said to our guide "The dam is moving?!"

"Yes." she replied, "It moves all the time."

These words did not inspire my confidence, so I kept my hands on the tunnel sides all the way through; apparently tunnels can also be used to relieve flood water pressure. As we went further down to the lower levels we came to the turbine halls, where the electricity is generated. They are huge buildings 1000 yards long by 250 wide and the noise carried by these halls is quite something else. During maintenance the turbines can be serviced by turning one off and the replacement parts can be brought to the exact spot via a train.

A new road bridge has recently been constructed over the canyon. It is a lot higher up, so you have to look up at it from the top of the dam. It is very impressive. However, they now have a problem with a lack of water and the two inlet towers are uncovered to a serious extent. Water is being pumped in from the surrounding areas, but as its location is in the Mohave Desert, water is hard to find.

If you have ever complained about summer heat in this country, try the Mohave Desert. As it was 45 degrees that day, we had decided to put the top down on our car. It was only supposed to be for a few seconds as the sun had burnt my bald head. However, at that moment a big truck pulled up alongside our car. The driver shouted at us,

"Are you British?!"

I responded "Yes. Does it show?"

"Shore does." He replied. "Put your top back up or you'll be in trouble with sun stroke. Have you got plenty of water?"

Luckily, we had, as the heat really was unbearable. We drove back to Las Vegas where it was much cooler, then we went to a show, as well as sorting out something to eat.

We really must thank the efforts of our son Nicholas, who arranged it all, he himself doing all the driving. We had a fantastic time.



History Within The Brecks

Lynford Water

The area we now know as Lynford Water looked very different 60,000 years ago when it was an open landscape inhabited by Neanderthal humans and very different wildlife. During excavation in 2002 a variety of animal bones and flint tools, including hand axes, were



unearthed and it is now believed that the area was used as a butchering site. Remains of at least nine woolly mammoths, a woolly rhino, a bear and reindeer were found here and it is therefore one of the most important Neanderthal sites ever found in Britain.



When gravel extraction ceased completely, the site was restored with the creation of a variety of habitats, including dry acid grassland, floodplain and reed beds that attract a wide variety of bird life. However, it is said that there is a mechanical digging water!

Open to the public, it is a popular area for dog walkers, bird watchers, open water swimmers, paddle boarders and

anyone wanting some pleasant exercise. A small beach with responsibility of Breckland. This meant plenty of sand and shallow water is popular with families during having to approach two authorities. the warm weather without the long drive to the coast.

Weeting Orchards

During the late Queen Elizabeth II's Platinum Jubilee in 2022, she wanted the country to plant trees and our Parish Council decided, (with Norfolk County Council's agreement), to use the piece of grass land in front of the Bowls Club as an orchard by planting a variety of fruit trees.

It usually takes a year or two for a fruit tree to establish itself sufficiently to produce fruit, but this year the little trees are doing well. Most of the apples are quite small as yet, so please leave them alone for a bit longer!

The trees along the Village Hall drive are growing well, but were planted later and therefore not likely to bear fruit this year.





Highway Maintenance in Weeting

After reporting the speed limit changes within the village in the June edition of Weeting Village Life, the Parish Council have been making notes about a few other highway issues.

First, we reported the lack of de-restriction signage when leaving the 30mph limit on the way to Brandon and the missing signs have now been installed.

Second, it was noticed that one of the streetlights on the Weeting Bends was damaged and hanging precariously over the footpath. Not sure how this happened but it was reported and the lamp removed the same evening. A new head was installed within a few days.



Third, following no less than three accidents when vehicles crashed through the fence of the bungalow on the corner of Saxon Place and Methwold Road, two of these accidents



on the same day, we asked the Breckland Highways Officer to meet us in the village in order to point out some of the grazing marsh, reed swamp mosaic signage defects. We had noticed that the painted "Give Way" lines across both ends of Saxon Place, Hereward Way and Cromwell Road were almost invisible, as well as the white triangles, due to wear and tear and partial obliteration when machine somewhere still under the the main road was re-surfaced some years ago. However,

> we discovered that whereas Hereward Way and Cromwell Road come under the jurisdiction of Norfolk County Council Highways, Saxon Place is the



Thankfully, our District Councillor, Robert Kybird, backed up our request and the white lines magically appeared within a few days. We would have liked some "Give Way" signposts too but guess that would have been asking too much!

When photographing the new white lines, it became very obvious that these junctions are covered with a lot of tyre 🖥 marks where vehicles approach the garage and a clear turning area can be seen at the far end of Hereward Way made by HGV's. These photos will enable us to report our findings to the relevant authorities.






Fourth, we are still waiting to find out why the road through Weeting was

downgraded from a B category (B1106) to a C category (C837) some years ago, especially since the volume of traffic has significantly increased. Highways have only recently stuck masking tape over the road numbers on the signpost at the Brandon Road and Peppers High Hill junction. No one seems to be able to give us an answer as yet!

Fifth, we are still waiting for a replacement bracket for our Sam 2 after it was removed during the work on moving the speed limit earlier this year. We will keep asking!

New Rules for Recycling

From Monday 18th November, anyone wishing to take items to a recycling centre within Norfolk must book a day and time slot for their visit.

Although this may seem rather an inconvenience, it really is very straight forward and will prevent having to queue at busy times. There are 16 bookable slots for every 15 minute period during their working hours and staff will be available to assist you if you need help. You can also book up to a week in advance. You can either book on-line if you have a computer or call a designated number to make your booking as follows:

Booking on-line:

- Type in Norfolk County Council
- Choose Rubbish, recycling & planning
- Choose Rubbish & recycling this will take you to a list of where all the recycling centres are and, also, how you can dispose of various types of waste, including hazardous, DIY and large items such as freestanding, fixed and fitted furniture.
- Click on the recycling centre of your choice and whether you are bringing household or business / trade waste.
- Click on the day of your choice within the next seven days on the calendar on screen. This will then show you how many free time slots there are available every 15 minutes throughout that chosen day.
- Choose the time slot you want, add your car registration number and select "BOOK"
- An email will be sent back to you confirming your booking.

Weeting Parish Council urges everyone to comply with this new regime and please remember that fly-tipping is an offence and fines can be very hefty if you are caught in the act, or the rubbish can be traced back to you.

A word of caution – if someone knocks on your door and offers to take away your DIY rubbish for a fee, make sure they are a bona fide company with a permit to take it away and dispose of it correctly. Not so long ago, a Weeting resident paid someone a significant fee, when they offered to take away his DIY rubbish, only to see, to his profound embarrassment, that this material had been found dumped in the forest off fire ride 23, photographed by dog walkers and the photos placed on the Weeting Facebook page!
